
Counseling Corner

Lunch Bunch is Back!

Good News! Due to a high success rate in previous years, my Lunch Bunch small counseling groups will back starting in December and continuing on throughout the rest of the year as needed.

This counseling service will be available for students in second and third grade who choose to participate. This year all the Lunch Bunch groups will center on the topic of "Self-Care." We will learn together through discussion, games, and activities, about how to care for ourselves mentally, physically, emotionally, and socially through our words, actions and thoughts. These groups will meet during students' lunch time for two consecutive weeks.

If your student selects that they want to participate in Lunch Bunch, they will bring home a note describing this small group, it's purpose, and my contact information, if you have any questions or concerns about this counseling service.



BULLYING PREVENTION

Kindergarten through sixth grade students will soon be starting the elearning Bullying Prevention program from the Children's Hospital's called Act Nowl during their Guidance classes. Kindergarten through fifth grade will have classroom lessons that are Smartboard based, along with classroom and parent/child activities. The sixth grade program involves the students navigating through an online program where they get to pretend to be different sixth grade students and make choices as to what these characters do in "bullying" situations. Based on these choices, other character's actions and the ultimate outcome

for them will look different.

Children's Hospital has also developed a complementary online bullying education and prevention program for parents called: Act Now! What Parents Need to Know About Bullying. This program is for any parents of students in K4 through high school. (Your child does not need to be in the grade doing the program at school for you to use this resource). It is an easy to use online program consisting of a series of short videobased lessons that include information on a variety of bullying topics tailored to parents with children in two different age groups: kids and teens.

What You Can Do to Protect Your Child From Sexual Abuse

The American Psychological Association has designated November 19, as the International Day for Prevention of Child Abuse. Below is some information that can help you do your part to prevent child abuse.

We can prepare children for what they might face if someone tries to abuse them. We can protect them from dangerous situations. And if a child says he or she has been abused, there are ways we can help.

Preparing Children for the Possibility of Abuse

- Children need lots of loving words and physical affection. Help your child feel secure in your love so they will be less likely to accept the unhealthy attention of an abuser.
- Remind your child that most people protect children and would never hurt them. However, some people seem nice but may do mean things. Encourage your child not to keep any secrets about someone like this.
- Help your child understand they should disobey anyone, even an adult, who tells them to do something wrong. Staying safe is more important than concerns about rudeness or authority.
- Teach your child to say "no" in words and body language. Help them learn to get away and tell you if anyone tries to touch them in a bad way.
- Make it easy for your child to talk to you. Spend time listening and observing. Take what your child says seriously.
- Give your child specific age appropriate definitions and examples of sexual abuse.
- Prepare your child to deal with bribes, threats, and physical force. Play, "What if?" games to help your child learn how to reach in different situations.
- Be aware of who spends time with your child.
 Unwanted touch may come from someone you like and trust. Get to know the adults and older children who are close to your child.
- Take care when choosing babysitters and daycare providers.
- Refuse to leave your child in the company of anyone you do not trust. Pay attention to what your child says and does around people, especially if they talk about feeling uncomforta-

ble or unsafe.

- Make sure your child can identify signs of trouble and can get away before something happens.
- Know where your child is at all times. If you allow them to go some places in public without you, ask them to stay with a buddy.
- Teach your child never to play in deserted areas.
- Set up a "password" for you and your child to use a secret clue. If it is safe for your child to go with someone, tell the person that password and instruct your child to ask for it before they leave with them.
- Talk to your child about safe Internet behaviors. Children should never give out information about themselves in chat rooms or email. Tell your child to let you know right away if someone they "met" online asks to see them in person.

Helping Children Who Have Been Harmed

- Children seldom lie about sexual abuse.
 They find it very hard to tell someone. If a child tells you about abuse, you need to listen carefully and believe what they say.
 Talk about it in a safe, private place.
- Reassure the child that they abuse isn't their fault and that telling you was the right thing to do.
- Don't blame the child for what happened.
- Don't over-react or minimize the incident.
 The effects of sexual abuse are different for each child.
- Understand that it may take time to figure out the problem.
- Know local resources, and choose help carefully.
- Let the child talk about the assault whenever they need to express feelings.
- If you learn that your child has been abused, be willing to talk with experts or counselors as a family.
- Report any abuse to authorities immediately. The number for Kewaunee County Social Services/Child Protective Services is (920)388-3777.


